Christians in some countries, especially Christian children, have no way to get Bibles. It can be difficult to hand out Bibles where people don't know about God.

"This is a very Muslim area, and the children seem to be trained not to take Bibles. Until now, I have only given out five Bibles. But two girls are happy for the Bibles I gave them and one of their mothers likes it and has read it quite a bit," said one worker. *Voice of the Martyrs persecution.com*

An estimated 6,000 churches across Rwanda have been closed and six pastors arrested. The pastors were accused of "masterminding" a plot to disobey the government.

About 700 churches have been closed in the capital, Kigal, according to reports by the Associated Press. New regulations being studied by the government would make it harder for churches to open and operate.

Rwandan President Paul Kagame has said that the nation has too many churches.

The country's population is 12 million, with the vast majority listed as Christian. *Diana Chandler, Baptist Press*
